n memory of our founding light, the School celebrated the birth anniversary of Dr. (Mrs.) Deepa Martins on April 5, 2022. Dr. Martins was the Founder Secretary of the St. Stephen's School Society and its founding light from its conception. The lecture series from the past nineteen years has helped us immortalise her memory and thoughts in the way she would most relate to.

This year, we were honoured to have Dr. Varsha Das, a highly acclaimed Gandhian scholar, prolific writer, art critic, translator and litterateur, as the Keynote Speaker and Ms. Aruna Roy, one of India's most prominent and thought-provoking social activists as the Guest of Honour. It was the first hybrid lecture where not only we witnessed the event face to face but also the people associated with the St. Stephen's Family were also able to join us virtually.

Ma'am Deepa, true to her name kindled the light of love and commitment into the lives of many. The lighting of lamp in front of her portrait signified the light which she

define her life as a whole are Dedication, Harmony, Universality, Empathy and Dialogue. Dr. Deepa was absorbed in the details of life.

Keeping her values and principles alive, we celebrated the day with the release of the Third Volume of *Deepalaya*. This volume is a compilation of the keynote addresses of our eminent keynote speakers at the Dr. (Mrs.) Deepa Martins Memorial Lectures from 2016 to 2021. Dr. Das and Ms. Roy released the volume.

Ms. Roy in her address to the gathering said, "Dr. Deepa was a source of energy when she lived, she is a source of energy even after she is gone because

she has pulled us all together today to think of her, to rejoice in what she was and to commemorate her memory."

Dr. Varsha Das delivered the Keynote Address on the topic "The Value of Reading, Art and

Literature: A Gandhian to Dr. Deepa Martins life and work, where she contributed substantially in various capacities.

She began the lecture by sharing a wonderful incident of her childhood when she had met Mahatma Gandhi. She was then one-and-a-half

grandparents were active participants in India's freedom struggle. When Gandhiji had come to Mumbai in 1944 to meet the people at the Juhu beach, her parents took her to meet him and seek his blessings. He had a big basket of mangoes next to him. He not only put his hand on her head but even gave her a mango. Maybe because of that mango she got the opportunity to work at the National Gandhi Museum, she shared on a lighter note.

According to her, Mahatma Gandhi is timeless. He will always remain relevant and has spoken on almost everything under the sun, he was the man of the masses. She quoted from Gandhiji's autobiography, "The limited reading may be said to have enabled me thoroughly to digest what I did read." The lecture inspired the students to digest the books we read. The process is similar to how we digest our food to get the energy and it becomes an inseparable part of us. In the same way, if we won't digest what we read, we cannot retain it and if we cannot retain, we cannot be benefitted from it. Gandhiji was highly inspired by the books which make a person a better human being. He had read 353 books and all of them were classics to which he called a small number. These books played an important role in his journey from Mohandas to Mahatma. Gandhiji got new ideas from the books he read as he digested that reading, took actions based on them and the whole world benefited from that. Bhagavad Gita was the dictionary for him for daily reference. He turned to it for solace and guidance whenever he found himself confronted with doubts and difficulties, trials and troubles.

It is therefore important to choose the right kind of book that would nurture us because it is not nature but nurture that makes all the difference. It initiates the

In her words, "When you know who your readers are, your thoughts start flowing and your pen will run on the paper." She concluded the address by encouraging the students to work in the spirit of Gandhiji, his passion and compassion, his determination and conviction and that we should keep his ideas and principles alive.

The Principal in her vote of thanks, extended her gratitude to Dr. Varsha Das for sharing the relevance of Gandhiji's ideals and their universal applicability in today's time.

INTERVIEW

In Conversation With Dr. Varsha Das



t was an honour having Dr. Varsha Das amongst us at the Nineteenth Dr. (Mrs.)

Deepa Martins Memorial Lecture. A few students interviewed her for the School Newsletter

'Stephania'. Here we share the conversation with her:

Ma'am you yourself are such a prolific writer. Who is your favourite author and what do you admire her/him for?

Ma'am Varsha Das- Oh! That's very difficult to say because I read many languages and books. When you are a student you need to read what's required for your studies but when you become professionals, you have to read so many manuscripts, solicited and unsolicited translations and there was hardly any time to read beyond that! There were so many books and novels on personal, experiences etc. But nowadays I like to read biographies, like what happened in someone's life, how that person struggled and kept walking in spite of the atrocities.

For the past 40 years I have been practising *Buddhism*. I was born a Jain, I lived next to a Mosque, I studied in St. Xavier's College and I was married to a Hindu. That's the beautiful diversity of our country! For my subject Sanskrit, I had to critically read *Bhagavad Gita*, *Upanishads*, manuscripts. In 1981, I started practising Buddhism and I found it very pragmatic. As my parents were Gandhians, we were never into religion, caste etc. We would sit together and recite 'Sarva Dharma Prarthana'. I also read books that are so relevant in the 21st century. Because I feel it's very important to live with the times and talk about topics that are relevant to our lives.

Apart from literature you are keenly interested in art, too. Recently, CBSE has integrated art into the academic curriculum largely. What advice would you give to the students to integrate art in academics?

Ma'am Varsha Das- When I was in school, I had an art



teacher with whom we had a daily period. He was a Bengali gentleman. We would all carry drawing books and colours. He would ask us to paint something, sometimes he would give us a theme and we would speed our brushes on it. He was the one who made me comfortable with art. My parents were art critics. We would frequently go for exhibitions, to art galleries, campaigns of art and many more. I was interested in art in many ways. I started writing about art without any study and research in this field. It is just your interpretation of the art.

Art should be seen in such a way that you don't need an intermediate person to explain to you that this is this and that's that. I think the most important to integrate art in your life is to see the art. If you can't go to galleries and exhibitions, you can read books which are on our great masters. There is so much art: paintings, cultural drawings, *Mandala* and *Warli* art. Even photography is a huge part of art. So seeing is very, very important. Without seeing you cannot react to it. And the way you react, you try to depict it. My father used to print a Gujarati newspaper, *Dharmayug*.

One fine day he came up to me and asked me to write for his newspaper. I did not have any art background; just watching, reacting and writing. When my writings became famous, Mr. Manohar Shyam Joshi, editor of 'Hindustan', the weekly newspaper, met me and asked me to write even



in his newspaper. Art polishes you and the way you see things. Each and every piece of art and writing inspires you and motivates you. Art is your intermediate soul speaking. We all possess this gift of God, but we draw limits with passing time.

As you are a multilinguist yourself, what according to you is the

importance of this facet in today's world?

Ma'am Varsha Das- Being a multi-linguist in today's world has a lot of significance. Through my involvement with the National Book Trust, I got the privilege to travel all over the country and I realized that possessing the knowledge of multiple languages can help you bond with other people without any restraints. I have had many experiences where I could spontaneously connect with strangers, through the language they speak and it always left them with a look of surprise on their faces. As a writer, whenever I read something soulful, I feel the need to translate it because, according to me, sometimes people are deprived of great literary masterpieces worth reading, due to language barriers. My family persuaded me to learn new languages like Bengali. I found that knowing one new language helped me get acquainted with many others because of the underlying similarities. That is how my translating career started and familiarized me with this truth, 'Language unites people'.

Though museums preserve the past, yet many people don't like to visit them, to read and know about our

past civilizations. How would you encourage the present generation to visit the museums?

Ma'am Varsha Das- My experience as the director of the National Gandhi Museum was a completely new discipline for me because throughout my life I was mainly involved in the writing and publishing industry only. But I adopted the



along with action and started by dealing with the chronological mistakes in the museum. I felt the urge to attract school and college students to the museum, as it had things which could reach out to them and help mould their perception. For this purpose, I personally wrote letters to the principals of the schools

in that region, inviting them to special thematic exhibitions in the museum. I also ensured that this museum was added into the list of the region's tourist sites. So, I believe that reaching out to others and spreading awareness about our own history is vital for encouraging people to visit museums.

In what ways can we, as students, preserve our local art and culture?

Ma'am Varsha Das- You can preserve our local art and culture by connecting with it and spreading awareness about it. It needs to be promoted and encouraged through various programmes and events that can be organized, even at the school level. We need to go out there and understand its significance. There should be a humane touch behind our intentions and actions. By doing this we can save our heritage.

The Beauty of Strings, Tune and Tones

e had the pleasure of interacting with the great sitar virtuoso Dhruv Bedi, an exponent of the illustrious *Imdadkhani Gharana* after his mesmerising Sitar-recital in our School.

Sir, when did you realise that you wanted to be a musician and why did you choose the Sitar as your instrument?

Shri Dhruv Bedi- I was born in a family of musicians and started learning music at the age of four from my father and *Guru* Shri Jagdeep Singh Bedi. There was always a beautiful ambience of music in my house, I grew up in an environment which was always full of melodies and that is how I became a sitarist.

Have you ever faced stage fear? How did you overcome it?

Shri Dhruv Bedi- When I was six years old, I gave my first recital and I had no idea what I was doing so I never had stage fear. Since then, I have been confident. But I remember when I had curated a whole one hour and fifteen minutes concert on my own for the very first time without any guidance that was when I actually did face stage fear but it was just for 2 to 3 minutes, and it was for the first and the last time. Once I enter my musical zone, the music carries me away and I feel content. Secondly, more than focusing on who are listening, I concentrate more on how to create a storyline out of the concert and engross myself completely in that moment.

What role does music play in your life?

Shri Dhruv Bedi- Music plays one of the biggest roles in my life. In fact, my life revolves around music. Even right now there is some or the other musical component going in my head, some melody or some rhythmic pattern. Involuntarily, I am always involved in music.

Sir, please share one of your most memorable experiences while performing at various places.

Shri Dhruv Bedi-Actually there are many to quoteshare but once when I was performing in New Zealand I was titled as the 'Singing Sitar' and that is something really memorable for me. Other than that, when I had performed in Russia, Spain and Switzerland with 108 musicians, that was another remarkable and highly appreciated concert. One of the most beautiful experiences was when I had the privilege of performing in front of our Hon'ble Prime Minister Mr. Narendra Modi. I felt so honoured.

What are the other activities that you pursue in your leisure time?

Shri Dhruv Bedi- Yoga, I love doing Yoga *asanas* and meditation. I have a deep inclination towards Yoga



things to share from the new poem they learnt, to the new game they played. The parents were satisfied with the School's management skills and approach towards Covid-19.





International Day of Families was celebrated on May 15, 2022 as it speaks on how well urbanization is




managed towards benefitting families and enhancing the wellbeing of all the generations. Activities like drawing a Family Tree, Collage Making and creating photo


Waste to Best Activity
